A group of notable speakers will be addressing the convention topic, "Liturgy of the Hours: The Evolution."



*Dr. J.J. Wright* currently serves as the director of the University of Notre Dame Folk Choir. As a conductor, pianist, composer, and producer his interests lie at the convergence of the creative process, music-making, spirituality, and liturgy. After an enlistment with the United States Naval Academy Band, J.J. completed his undergraduate degree in jazz piano at the New School for Jazz and Contemporary Music. Moving to the University of Notre Dame for graduate studies, J.J. received his

Doctor of Musical Arts from the Program in Sacred Music and was awarded Mellon Foundation and Lilly Endowment Fellowships during his studies. J.J. was awarded the Frank and Domenica Annese Dissertation Fellowship from the Nanovic Institute of European Studies to live in Rome, Italy, for one year while he wrote and composed his dissertation, "Drama and Devotion at

Chiesa Nuova: Translating Anerio's Teatro Armonico to Jazz Oratorio," took classes at the Pontifical Institute of Sacred Music, and interned with the Sistine Chapel Choir.

Fr. Anthony Ruff, OSB is a monk and priest of Saint John's Abbey (Collegeville, Minn.). He teaches theology, liturgical music, and Gregorian chant. He has master's degrees from St. John's and Yale University, and he earned

his doctorate in liturgy from the University of Graz, Austria. He has studied organ with Kim Kasling, Thomas Murray, and Peter Planyavsky. He is the founding director of the National Catholic Youth Choir, a summer camp and touring experience at St. John's for high school singers. He served on the music subcommittee of the national Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy that drafted the 2007 document of the U.S. bishops Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship. He was chair of the committee of three people that wrote the English chant melodies for the 2011 Roman Missal for all the English-speaking countries. He has served on the board of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians and the leadership team of the Catholic Academy of Liturgy, and he has served on the executive committee of the Hymn Society. He is a frequent presenter across the U.S. and internationally on topics of liturgy and music, he serves as English-German translator for the Internationale Arbeitsgemeinschaft für Hymnologie, and he frequently publishes in liturgical and musical journals. He plays organ and directs Gregorian chant at the abbey. He is moderator of the popular liturgy blog "Pray Tell."



Br. John Glasenapp, OSB is Assistant Professor of Music and Director of the Institute for Sacred Music at Saint Meinrad Seminary and School of Theology. He earned his M.A. in Medieval Studies from Fordham University and his Ph.D. in Historical Musicology

from Columbia University. His doctoral research on the long history of the Beaupré Antiphoner was supported by the Alliance-Council for European Studies and the U.S. Fulbright Program to Belgium. He has spoken at numerous academic conferences in the U.S. and Europe, including those of the American Musicological Society, the International Medieval Congress (University of Leeds, U.K.), and the Cantus Planus study group of the International Musicological Society. His recent article, "Nuns, Cistercian Chant and Observant Reform in the Southern Low Countries," appeared in *Women and Monastic Reform in the Medieval West, c. 900 – 1500: Debating* 

*Identities, Creating Communities* published by Boydell & Brewer in 2023.

Sister Cecilia Dwyer, OSB received a B.M. in Music Education from Marywood University in Scranton, Penn., and an M.A. in Liturgical Theology from Catholic University of America. Sister Cecilia has been liturgy director and accompanist for her community, St. Benedict's (Bristow, Va.), since 1973. She



taught piano and elementary school for several years and then became formation and vocation director. Having a great love for monasticism, Sister Cecilia has given retreats in Benedictine communities for many years, as well as acting as election facilitator and canonical visitator to other Benedictine monasteries.

In 1987 she was elected prioress and served until 1999, then was re-elected in 2003 to serve until 2019. While in leadership, Sister Cecilia had the privilege of being chair of LCWR Region 4 and a member of the National LCWR board, the Bishops' National Advisory Committee, and the Arlington Diocesan Pastoral Council. Sister Cecilia currently serves on the monastic council and as formation director and the director of mission integration for the monastic community. She is also on the Board of DIMMID –



the international organization for interreligious monastic dialogue.

Sister Joanna Burley, OSB is prioress of the Benedictine Sisters of Virginia (Bristow). She coordinates her community's Liturgy of the Hours using electronic media.

In addition to these speakers, there will be a time for meetings of the various interest sections of the Academy, an art display, social events and, most important of all, the opportunity to get together in person after two online conventions and nearly six years without the personal interaction that makes the biennial convention so valuable and enjoyable.

#### **CANON LAW COLUMN**

#### Legal Autonomy vs. Genuine Autonomy of Life

In this issue, we welcome guest columnist Sister Nancy Bauer, OSB, JCD

Benedictine monasteries enjoy and protect their autonomy. But what, really, is the nature of the autonomy they are protecting? I will draw on two related documents to address this question from a canonical perspective. The first document is Pope Francis' 2016 apostolic constitution *Vultum Dei quaerere* (VDQ), which contains new canonical norms for monasteries of nuns (*moniales*), and the second is CICLSAL's 2018 instruction *Cor orans* (CO) which explains how to implement the first.

While these documents apply only to women religious who are canonically categorized as nuns, they contain definitions and other information useful for Benedictine monasteries of monks and sisters (sorores), especially in current circumstances when many of these monasteries are experiencing a decline in membership. For example, *Vultum Dei quaerere* and *Cor orans* supply criteria for assessing the viability of a monastery. Of great significance in this regard is the distinction introduced by Pope Francis between a monastery's legal or juridical autonomy and its real or genuine autonomy of life. *Cor orans* addresses this distinction in greater detail.

Juridical autonomy is a monastery's canonical status, which it acquires when it is established or erected as an independent monastery. A monastery can be established directly by the Holy See, but more often a Benedictine monastery begins as a dependent priory of an existing monastery or of a monastic federation or congregation. It acquires its own juridical autonomy when it becomes capable of being independent of its founding entity. According to Cor orans, criteria for gaining canonical autonomy include the following: vital community life with at least eight members in perpetual profession; members capable of serving as superior, formator, and financial administrator; a monastery building suitable to the lifestyle of the community; and financial stability (CO 39).

A legally autonomous monastery is one whose superior – abbess, prioress, abbot, or prior – is a major superior. It has a stable community; it accepts its own candidates and has its own novitiate and formation

program; and it is a public juridic person with the capacity to acquire, possess, administer, and alienate temporal goods (CO 15).

Genuine autonomy or real autonomy refers, for the most part, to the vitality of monastic life within the monastery. Criteria by which to assess the genuine autonomy of life are the following: at least a minimal number of members, provided the majority are not elderly; the energy to practice and spread the charism; the capacity to provide personnel for governance and formation; dignified liturgical life; vital community and spiritual life; financial stability; and suitable buildings (VDQ Art. 8 §1). Genuine autonomy is the ability to manage the life of the monastery in all its dimensions, including vocational, formative, governmental, relational, and economic (CO 18).

Juridical autonomy and genuine autonomy are interrelated. "Juridical autonomy needs to be matched by a genuine autonomy of life (VDQ Art. 8 \$1)." Juridical autonomy is not granted if genuine autonomy is lacking (CO 18) and juridical autonomy may be revoked if a monastery cannot maintain genuine autonomy (CO 43). In other words, a monastery may be suppressed if it no longer has the capacity for vital monastic life in its many dimensions, that is, the membership is minimal and most are elderly; there have been no candidates for a number of years; there is a lack of capacity to form new members; there are no longer members capable of serving in leadership, which includes the role of superior and council; finances are insufficient, and the liturgical life lacks dignity, etc.

While VDQ and CO do not apply to Benedictine monasteries of monks and sisters, the distinction these two documents make between juridical autonomy and genuine or real autonomy of life are useful in developing criteria for assessing the viability of such monasteries and, thus, for determining when it is time to consider suppression of a particular monastery.

#### IN MEMORIAM



Tom Piazza, longtime member of the ABA, and serving on the board of directors since 2020, resigned from the board recently due to ill health and died on January 14, 2024.

His devotion to Benedictine life goes back to some years as a member of St. Leo Abbey (St. Leo, Fla.) during the 1960's and later as a friend and frequent visitor.

Tom held a Ph.D. in sociology from Berkeley and an S.T.L. in theology from Sant'Anselmo in Rome. He was the principal survey statistician for many years at UC Berkeley's Survey Research Center, taught sampling in the School of Public Health, and was manager of Survey Documentation and Analysis. In later years, he turned his expertise to analysis of trends in Benedictine life, producing articles for the American Benedictine Review documenting current membership trends and suggestions for reversing them. In his profile for election to the board, he wrote, "It is my hope that the ABA can serve as a helpful resource for communities that are trying to adapt to difficult circumstances. My background and experience in social science academic research provide a useful perspective on the current situation, and as an ABA Board member I will try to be of further service to the Benedictine family." Indeed, he did fulfill that promise.

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

A Cloister in the World: Emerging Visions of Leadership in Contemporary Benedictine School Chaplaincy by J. P. Bryant (LAP Lambert Academic Publishing, 2023) 356 pp., ISBN 978-6206150923, \$77.89 (\$9.99 ebook).

Dr Bryant is a Catholic social scientist graduating from St. Mary's University, England. His book, which is written within the tradition of phronetic social science, offers a unique insight into the life of three English Benedictine schools and specifically explores how these schools are adapting to the changing demographics of their founding monastic communities. Although there are now less monks available to work as teachers and chaplains, this is seen as an opportunity for the laity to take their responsibilities in the Church seriously, often in dialogue with members of the Benedictine congregation. Such dialogue is marked by a genuine commitment to collaborative ministry in contrast to a paternalistic or hierarchical paradigm.

The main aim of the book is to discover how lay Benedictine chaplains can lead the spiritual life of their schools in such a way as to maintain the Benedictine ethos and transmit the Benedictine charism to their pupils. Although this work is just the beginning of a much-needed effort to establish foundations for the future of Benedictine education, it contains fruitful Benedictine leadership wisdom gathered in interviews with people at the forefront of Benedictine education: abbots, governors, headteachers, chaplains and lay chaplains all have a voice and share vital insights clearly and succinctly.

Dr. Bryant's work is certainly valuable for anyone with an interest in Catholic education, especially Benedictine education. However, it would also be of considerable benefit for anyone interested in the Benedictine monastic tradition and the future of its leadership in education.

The 2024 Conference of Benedictine Prioresses meeting was hosted by the sisters in Beech Grove, Ind.

The theme was taken from Rule of Benedict: Chapter 2:4: "The Prioress should keep in mind that she has undertaking the care of souls." 37 prioresses attended in person and another 9 joined by Zoom.

A speaker from Saint Luke Institute, Dr. Emily Cash, spent one day with the assembly talking about the challenges, boundaries, tensions, and changes facing leadership today and ways to maintain healthy teams and do self-care. Time was given for each community to share what was going on in their communities. In addition, there were reports on the North American Benedictine Vocation Formation Conference, the 55 & Under Group, AIM, and CIB, the international group of Benedictine women who held their meeting this year in Cullman, Ala. A financial report and discussion of policy matters were included in the meeting, as well as prayer, social events and informal time together. Next year's meeting will take place at Mount St. Scholastica in Atchison, KS., January 28 to February 4, 2025.

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Subsequent to the sudden death of Sister Priscilla Cohen, OSB (Sacred Heart Monastery, Cullman, Ala.), Father Meinrad Miller, OSB, has become president of the North American Association of Benedictine Oblate Directors (NAABOD). Father Meinrad, a monk of St. Benedict's Abbey (Atchison, Ks.) was the vice-president of the organization.

The biennial meeting of the group will be held at the St. Benedict Center in Schuyler, Neb., from July 5 to July 9, with the theme "Carrying Wisdom Across the Threshold." Speakers will be Abbot Joel Rippinger (Marmion Abbey, Aurora, Ill.) and Sister Judith Sutera (Mount St. Scholastica, Atchison, Ks.).

#### ABA ESSAY CONTEST

Each convention year, the Academy holds an essay contest to encourage scholarship and appreciation for Benedictinism among those who have been professed religious or oblates for less than 10 years.

The word essay comes from the French *essayer*, which means to try, test, probe. We are looking for personal essays of no more than 2,500 words that are built on solid reasoning and research, but also include vivid anecdotes that support the premise of the essay and show the author's personal involvement in, or attraction to, the chosen topic.

Essays are not academic or research papers. However, they include both the objective (that is, research elements) and the subjective (such as the author's personal reaction to or struggle with the topic). The essay does not have to be the final word on a topic but rather show the author's thinking process and how he/she came to their conclusions.

Some possible topics, are, but would not be limited to:

- A reflection on a particular Benedictine value that offers a fresh perspective on that value (such as community, consensus, humility, hospitality, conversatio)
- A verse/chapter of RB that has been a particular gift/challenge been to you
- Living RB in a concrete way in your daily life
- How chapters on humility or leadership or discipline are relevant to issues facing today's world
- Whether contemplation is possible in the age of social media
- How the monastic call can be re-imagined for the 21 century
- Considering how persons (not professed Benedictines) can manage to live out the Rule in the secular world
